## **Course Description:**

This course examines the dynamics of interstate conflict—its inception, development, and termination—from a variety of perspectives: the international system and the society of states; the domestic arena and public opinion; and the identities, beliefs, and perceptions of decision-makers. We do that by undertaking a comprehensive review of the literature on theories in international relations. We examine the leading theories, their key variables, the causal paths connecting them, and the possible ways to test them. We also give some attention to the degree of empirical support for various theories and hypotheses. Our survey includes research utilizing comparative case studies, quantitative empirical methods, and formal modeling approaches. We also give some attention to methodological questions relating to epistemology and research design. Our primary focus, however, is on the logical coherence and analytical limitations of the theories and the kinds of research designs that might be useful in testing them.
